
QUIZZING ON THE BOOKS YOU READ



You can complete reading quizzes during your remote learning sessions or between 8:35-16:00 on weekdays.

You must read the whole book before you quiz. You must not look at the book while you are taking the quiz.

Search the title of the book or the quiz number inside the front cover

At the end of the quiz you will see if you passed the quiz and how many words you have read. The results save automatically.

Choose and complete reflection tasks as you're reading your books and keep a record of their details when you finish them and quiz on Accelerated Reader. Try and complete each task at least once. You don't need to have finished your book to do a reflection task.

Examples of reflection tasks and reading records

	1) Choose a favourite character. Describe them. Explain why you like them.	2) Draw a scene, a character or a map of the story's location.	3) What genre is the book? What are the characteristics of this genre?	4) Why did you choose this book?
	5) Give examples of three literary techniques the author has used. (e.g. Metaphor/simile, imagery, personification, flashbacks)	6) Pick a meaningful quote and explain why it is important to the story or important to you.	7) Pick three words and define them. OR Pick three words and explain why they are effective.	8) Only looking at the front cover, what information does it give you and what can you infer?
	9) Describe the setting of part of the story. (Use the five senses)	10) What do you like about the story so far?	11) What does the story teach you?	12) Write a timeline of events so far.
	13) Summarise the story so far in thirty words or fewer.	14) Read the blurb, what questions does it leave you with?	15) Write what you expect to happen next. (Check back to see if you were right!)	16) Write an acrostic poem using the title or a character's name.

If you run out of books you can read the opening chapters of a wide range of books to experience new genres and styles of writing. You can complete reflection tasks on these chapters.
